Make a musical rain stick






You will need

 Old cardboard tube (the thicker the better)



· Marker pen




Masking tape



· Cardboard









Crayons, markers or paint



Draw dots 2cm apart along the length of the cardboard tube. They don't have to be in a straight line - a spiral pattern works well.





Hammer a nail into the tube at each mark (don't let the nails poke out through the other side).



Wrap a long piece of masking tape over the nail heads so they don't injure little hands or get pulled out!

If your tube doesn't have any plastic lids, make your own by drawing round the end of the tube (twice) onto card and cutting out. Seal a lid at one end of the tube with some masking tape.





Pour a handful of dried beans or rice into the tube, then secure the open end with a lid and tape.



Decorate the outside of the tube - you may want to draw on your favourite wildlife and flowers or you may have a theme - it is completely up to you!



When you have finished decorating it, gently tip the tube upside down and listen to the rain!



Make your own binoculars





You will need

 Two cardboard tubes (you can use toilet roll tubes)




String




Scissors







Cut your paper to size, then cover your tubes with glue and wrap the paper around them.




Using a pen or hole puncher, insert a hole at the side of each tube, about a third of the way down.




3 Glue the two tubes together so that the holes are facing the outside.




Insert string into one of the holes from the outside of the tube. Bring it through the tube and tie a chunky knot. Gently pull the string back from the outside. Repeat on the other side.



The knot will stop the string coming back through the hole. Place a rubber band around the tubes to help the glue set. Leave to dry over night.



6 Remove the elastic band and then decorate them with pens!
